Just how well do you . . . .



- 1. How many stairwells and elevators are in your building?
- 2. Can you describe three different routes from your apartment to exit the building?
- 3. Which, if any, of your building exits include stairs?
- 4. Where are the fire doors near your apartment that close in an emergency?
- 5. Can you locate fire pulls, fire extinguishers, house phones and Automated External Defibrillators (AED) in your building and in other buildings you use?
- 6. Do you know exit routes from all the buildings you use on campus?



## Develop *Situational Awareness* wherever you are. Stay as safe as possible when alarms sound.

## SHELTER IN PLACE

If safe, stay where you are.
Fire doors at strategic points in our buildings close automatically and are barriers.
Fire doors *do not lock*; they are heavy but you can always open them.
Follow Staff and First Responder instructions.

## EXIT WHEN INSTRUCTED BY STAFF/ FIRST RESPONDERS or IF WHERE YOU ARE IS DANGEROUS

Know the location of ALL building stairwells and exits.Know where stairwell exits lead in all buildings you use.Study the Emergency Evacuation Maps posted near elevators.

If you have mobility issues, know the location of exits that do not require stairs to vacate a building. (Examples: main entrances, Triangle Garden, north wall of Riverview, near admin offices in Plaza, Court parking areas)

Follow Staff and First Responder instructions. Exit immediately if told to do so. Do not collect personal belongings.
